# You're Welcome!

Matthew 25:34-40 Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me.' Then the righteous will answer him,

saying, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? And when did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? And when did we see you sick or in prison and visit you?' And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me.'

When you hear the words, "you're welcome," what do they bring to mind? Your first thought might be that they are an appropriate response to someone thanking you for something you have done. They can also be words of invitation, as in "you're welcome to join us" or "welcome, we're glad you're here."

While these uses of the word "welcome" may be a little different in nature, they are also deeply connected. After all, we are certainly thankful when someone welcomes us, and it is certainly welcoming when a person is clearly thankful for the opportunity to interact with us. Moreover, what can be more welcoming than when a person has lived out the sort of kindness in our lives that gives us reason to be truly thankful?

When you think about it, which is the more powerful thanks or welcome; to have people thank us for one kind action, or to have someone look at their interactions with us and say, "Thank you for being you!" Individual and random acts of kindness can be powerful things. However, when we establish the kind of welcoming relationships, for which someone says, "thank you for being you," who knows what kind of doors might open? For example, think how much more likely we are to offer and receive welcome and invitations, and how this in turn can cause our relationships with each other to grow even more.

This same understanding of welcoming relationships applies to us as a family of believers as well. Do we want to be a congregation that sometimes does the things a few people find welcoming, or do we want to be the kind of congregation which can truly be called a welcome congregation? In other words, how can we be the kind of Christ-like family of believers that not only makes people feel welcome once they walk through our doors, but also welcomes people into a relationship with Jesus and our church through how we interact with and care for others each and every day of our lives?

Jesus says, in Matt. 25, "whatever you did for the least of these strangers you did it onto me". Through welcoming others and providing them with a reason to give thanks, not only are we welcoming them into a relationship with us and the Lord, we are once again welcoming the Lord's presence among us. What a joy to welcome those that the Lord has welcomed, as well as to welcome the Lord who first welcomed us. What a welcome!

Now this may all sound a bit overwhelming, but it really does begin one welcoming interaction at a time. We have already seen a few new faces recently among us because of the interactions of our members in the community. I have experienced how this congregation has welcomed those new faces with much joy. Can you hope, dream, and imagine what this congregation might be like if we continue to grow in our identity as a welcome congregation, through who we are, here and out in the world? Natural Church Development and our church-wide spiritual growth emphasis, *The Best is Yet to Come*, are two examples of how our congregation is already working together to do just that, and that's not all.

In addition to my ongoing encouragement to all of you to connect with and get to know new faces at church, efforts are in place to put together a Welcome Center in the Narthex at church, where information can be shared and visitors to the church can be made to feel even more welcome. There will be an opportunity for some of you to become trained greeters. Also remember, being a welcoming church begins outside the church doors. Therefore, I welcome all of you to continue to build those caring relationships around you, both new and old, and if you haven't already, please begin to invite these individuals to join you in experiencing the love of Christ here at Faith Memorial, in your small groups, in your homes, and elsewhere, by showing them that in Christ they truly are welcome.

### THOUGHTS FROM THE DEACONESS

"Let go . . ."

Over the decades, and one suspects for centuries, Christians have put together pithy phrases. These short phrases – what would Jesus do; prayer changes things; let go and let God, e.g. – have a kernel of truth, but aren't entirely accurate in their depiction of God's work in this world. Often these phrases are used when life is difficult or when direction from God is desired or maybe when we want God to relieve us of responsibility. The phrase can temporarily "get us off the hook" when we should really get much more involved.

On May 22<sup>nd</sup>, FMLC will be celebrating its 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Sixty years ago on June 10, a group of Lutherans in Porter County, Indiana, gathered for worship at Liberty Township School. Later that day, Faith Memorial Lutheran Church was officially organized. The name "Faith" was chosen because the future growth of the tiny mission would be under God's guidance. "Memorial" was added to commemorate the 90<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Immanuel Lutheran congregation in Valparaiso, the celebration of which had resulted in the idea for a new mission on the north side of Valparaiso.

The six families who formed the nucleus of the congregation didn't just let go and let God. They got to work. By May 24, 1957, the sanctuary was dedicated with 54 communicant members and 36 children enrolled in Sunday School. If those first families had just "let go and let God" it is highly unlikely that a sanctuary would have been needed. While it is appropriate for us to let God guide and direct us in the spreading of the Gospel, it is not appropriate to sit and wait and do nothing.

We are at a crossroads at FMLC. There are people in Valparaiso who are hurting and hopeless. They are grieving the loss of job, broken families, and the death of loved ones. They don't have a circle of supportive friends or co-workers. They don't know Jesus as their loving Savior and Comforter and Healer. They need God and us. Are we going to help them? Are we going to reach beyond ourselves and our comfortable circle at FMLC? Are we going to be willing to change and let go of old ideas and routines? Are we willing to put aside our prejudices in order to follow a Savior who was willing to touch lepers? Are we willing to "let go ..

"and let God help us."?

Many many thanks to all those who helped during my time of injury. Special thanks to the choir and cantors for working with Deb Porter and a new accompanist. And extra thanks to Deb for covering all those worship services at the busiest time of the Church Year. My stress level was considerably lower knowing that you were taking of the music and worship.

Our church building is being used now more than ever for church events as well as private party groups. As happy as we are for this development in church use, now is the time to put some thought and attention into the details.


