Deck the Halls!

Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise! Give thanks to him; bless his name! ⁵ For the LORD is good; his steadfast love endures forever, and his faithfulness to all generations. (Psalm 100:4-5)

Most of us probably know the old Christmas song that begins, "Deck the Halls with Boughs of Holly!" Which makes sense because we see holly in all kinds of Christmas Decorations. Holly is used in everything from mistletoe to any number of what most would likely consider secular Christmas decorations. Throughout the centuries holly has been given many different symbolic meanings. However, Christians have also assigned it a special meaning of our own.

If any of you have holly bushes growing in your yard, like my family does, you can probably testify that holly is a very hardy shrub that can survive some of the most extreme temperatures. As a result a holly bush has become a symbol that represents immortality, a gift granted to us by the very savior whose birth-day we celebrate each Christmas.

Known for its attractive red berries and sharp green leaves, holly can be quite beautiful. However, I can tell you from experience, holly's leaves also have an unpleasant side in the form of several sharp points on each leaf. These prickly leaves have been seen as a symbol of the crown of thorns that pierced Jesus's head during the crucifixion. This has resulted in holly sometimes being called "Christ Thorn" in parts of Europe and "Christdorn" in Germany. The shiny red berries also remind us of the blood of Christ shed on our behalf. As a result, Holly serves as a reminder of why Jesus was born and the price he paid so he could graciously give us the gift of immortality and an eternal relationship with him. This is also why in parts of Europe holly is not only a Christmas decoration, but used at Easter at well.

One last thing I think is worth noting is that the name holly can also mean Holy one. Whether it is the green of new birth and immortality, or the thorny tips and red berries of Christ's sacrifice, at the heart of it all stands a holy Savior. The holiness of Christ sets Him apart. Yet out of love for us, the Son of God stepped into our sin scarred world and became man, so that He could redeem us and be our righteousness. Because of Christ, we too have been set apart, given new life, and a renewed relationship with God. This is truly something both to embrace and to celebrate.

This year as you look around and see various holiday decorations including holly, I hope they will serve as a reminder of all that Christ has done for you. When they do, take a moment to lift up a prayer of thanks and celebration, and look for some opportunities to share with those around you the full story of why we Christians celebrate Christmas. After all, if a beautiful but prickly shrub can do it, so can you.

A New Church Year

Are you one of those people who struggle with sleep? Do you have trouble falling asleep? Is it difficult to stay asleep? Does your life pass before your eyes almost every night? Do you relive the days' events? Do you stress over the next day or week or even years? Taking into account the number of television commercials for sleep aids, you are not alone.

Whenever I teach a class on the Psalms, I am always amazed at the Jewish interpretations of creation and humans and God. They have much to teach us about how to live in a full relationship with God. One of their beliefs concerning creation and God is not one that is practiced in the lives of most Americans. For the Jewish people, the new day begins at 6pm, not 6am. Gathering around the supper table is a chance to begin a new day. As they crawl into bed, the previous day has been completed for several hours and the new day already has a strong foothold. With that belief comes the more profound realization that God has wiped clean the past day with its pain and regret. God is now working in the new day. As we sleep, God is at work in the present and future. God is there long before we open our eyes. What a wondrous way to greet the day when we awake. God is at work and in charge of the day and of our lives before our feet hit the floor.

Advent is here again – a time of beginnings and a new church year. As God is even now working in the new day, God is at work in this new year. We have no need to replay the past year. We have no need to live with regrets and guilt. God has wiped those from the past. In fact, God is so deep into the future of this new year, that we can live confident in God's love. For God has already given us Jesus Christ in the manger, on the cross, and outside an empty tomb.

Maybe sleep won't be so elusive for us.

CHRISTIAN GROWTH AND FELLOWSHIP CHURCH "GREENING" FELLOWSHIP




