Luke 10:38-42 <sup>38</sup> Now as they went on their way, Jesus entered a village. And a woman named Martha welcomed him into her house. <sup>39</sup> And she had a sister called Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet and listened to his teaching. <sup>40</sup> But Martha was distracted with much serving. And she went up to him and said, "Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me to serve alone? Tell her then to help me." <sup>41</sup> But the Lord answered her, "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and troubled about many things, <sup>42</sup> but one thing is necessary. Mary has chosen the good portion, which will not be taken away from her."

A dear Pastor I know absolutely loves to tell Midwestern Jokes about a couple called Ole and Lena. His love for these jokes has rubbed off on me, so consider yourself warned. With all of the cold weather we have been having one story in particular came to mind:

It can also distract us from the things that really matter, like spending time with God and directing our love and energy toward people in ways that are far more meaningful.

Since many people like to give things up for Lent, why not give up some of the little and unnecessary stuff to make room for some time with God. Perhaps, there are some times when you could leave the car in the garage today and sit down by yourself or with your spouse, or the rest of your family, and engage God that much more deeply. In a lot of ways this is an important part of the Lenten Journey or Discipline. We could all use the opportunity to look at our lives and see how we can grow in our relationship with God through repentance, prayer, and just slowing down to breathe in God's Word. So take time this week to slow down and take a deep breath. Ask God what things you should be doing and what things can be put aside. Then take a few extra moments to really spend some quality time with Him

Keep in mind as you do this that just like there are many things we don't need to do, there are also things we can't do. One of them is earn God's love or our salvation. God has already given these things freely throught Jesus Christ. Lent is as much a season of God's love as it is a season of repentance. So take advantage of the cold, snuggle up to Jesus, thank Him for all He has done, and get to know His love and His longings for your life that much better. I know it will be worth it. In Christ,

#### NOTES FROM THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Did you ever wonder how the dates for Lent and Easter are determined each year? We didn't think so, but we're going to tell you anyway. Easter is determined first and we



work backward to find all of Lent. Easter is always the first Sunday AFTER the first full moon ON OR AFTER the "Metonic Cycle" equinox, which is ALWAYS March 21. (The "true equinox" based on sun and planetary cycles is always near the 21st but actually slightly more often on the 20th.) Easter can, thus, be anywhere from March 22 to April 25. This year it is on April 5. Now, from April 5 count backwards 40 days (not counting Sundays which are technically not "in" Lent) and you hit February 18, Ash Wednesday. It has been this way uniformly (except in some Orthodox churches) since the 8th century when the church adopted the 325 AD Council of Nicea's rule on determining Easter. Try to memorize all of this because there may be a pop quiz next year.

Meanwhile join us during Lent for Sunday services and Bible Study, for Wednesday Soup Suppers at 6 PM and services at 7:00 PM, for all Holy Week services and, of course, for Easter Services and other events. Happy Lent. Happy Equinox. Happy Easter. In that order.

Names"

"When someone loves you, the way they say your name is different. You know that your name is safe in their mouth." Jan Karon

Take a moment and think about the people in your life – both past and present – who call you by your first name. What is your relationship to those people? Probably parents or grandparents are on that list. Then there may be teachers, children, co-workers, neighbors. When they used your first name, how did you react? How could one word make you feel complete joy or complete terror! Maybe there were those times in school when you promised God all sorts of things if the teacher wouldn't use your first name. If that happened, you would have to admit you didn't know the answer.

Our first name is important. Using it implies some familiarity between us and the person using it. When I am teaching at the university, I give my students permission to use my first name, or Miss Graef, or Prof. Graef. I want them to be comfortable with our relationship and to establish for them what that will be. Once they have decided, I know how to relate to and work with them to reach their musical goals.

Jesus was very aware of the importance of names. When he refers to himself as the Good Shepherd, he was giving us a name to use for him. This name tells us that Jesus is good and that he will also be our guide on our daily path. But more importantly than having a name for Jesus, he knows our names. When we hear our names called, we respond with joy and not terror.

As we move forward in ministry at Faith Memorial, we will be working with fellow members to spread the Gospel. We already know each other's first names and we know that we are members of Jesus' flock. The new faces that will visit our congregation will have first names that we need to learn. When we use those names, may we say them in ways that bring joy to the hearers and assurance that they too are sheep in Jesus' flock. May those names be "safe in our mouths".




