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The Reformation: He Nailed it!

2 Corinthians 5:17-21 Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come. ¹⁸ All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation; ¹⁹ that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation. ²⁰ Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us. We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. ²¹ For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

On this 500th anniversary of the reformation there are plenty of things people picture and celebrate. Luther's hand confidently raised to swing the hammer blow whose effects would be heard round the world; Luther's pen poised to write out scripture in the language of the people in open defiance of those powers who had banned him from doing so; Luther's bold statement, "Here I stand, I can do no other," as he was put on trial for his faithful actions; it would be easy to look at Luther or some of the other reformers and think wow *they* nailed it! We might also be tempted to take our Lutheran or German heritage, traditions, or other aspects of reformation history from 500 years ago until now and make these our primary focus.

However, on this 500th anniversary of the reformation, it is important to ask ourselves what is at the heart of these events? What are we really celebrating? Where does true reformation come from? For that we first look not to the hammer in Luther's hand, but to another hammer poised over the bloody hand of Christ, and the grace that was given through our Lord's sacrifice. We look not just to the particular translation that Luther wrote out, but to the entire Word of God that spoke the world into being, that proclaimed His truth through the prophets and through those He gave the scriptures, and which brought new life and healing into the world through the Living Word as He dwelt, died, and rose again among us. Put on trial for the sins of the world, Jesus stood in the gap where no one else could stand, showing us once again that God is faithful and that faith in Christ alone is a foundation worth building on.

Grace, Faith, God's Word, and throughout all these Christ alone, these are at the heart of what we celebrate when we celebrate Luther and the reformation. They are also at the heart of THE REFOR-MATION...not just the one that took place in 16th century Germany, but God's ongoing reforming and renewal of all creation and all who believe. God's work through Luther and others was not something new. God's plan and process of reformation has been ongoing ever since the fall. Each time people fall away, distort the truth and love of God, and begin to miss the true center and focus of what is most important, God has brought us back. Grace, Faith, God's Word, and especially Christ and our relationship with God, these are what give the actions of Luther their meaning. These are what give the world and its history its meaning. These are what give our actions today their meaning. And when it comes to the ultimate Reformation of our hearts, minds, and the world to come, we can take heart, for Jesus has already nailed it down.

So as we celebrate this 500^{th} anniversary of the reformation to God be the Glory. Amen. In Christ,

Theme: The Formula of Concord


October 29 Worship of the Reformation

THOUGHTS FROM THE DEACONESS

"What do we know about God?"

PBS ran a TV series this spring titled "Victorian Slum House". Families, couples, and individuals from Great Britain lived as their ancestors had in the late 1800's. All of the ancestors, at some time in their lives, had to survive in a slum house in London's east end. The recreation of those decades was phenomenal and eye-opening. Kudos to the 21st century people who desired to connect with their ancestors in this way.

The series, along with the fact that the church is celebrating the 500th anniversary of the Reformation on October 31, left me wondering about life in the Catholic Church during the time of Martin Luther (1483-1546). Since the average person could not read, there were no hymnals or Bibles. The liturgies and hymns of the church were in Latin which was not the common language of the people. Indulgences were sold to get people out of purgatory and into heaven. But as a professor shared, "The money was really raised to build basilicas and cathedrals. Those buildings were built on the backs and the blood of the people. The church lied." Worship was led only by the priests. We would have not been allowed to read the scriptures or partake of the wine at communion or assist at the altar. Confessing one's sins to the priest led to arbitrary acts of penance. But could one really be sure the sin was forgiven after doing the rosary three times? Access to God was only through a saint. For women, that saint was the Virgin Mary. There was no confidence in forgiven sins or life eternal in heaven. All one knew was sin and an imperfect relationship with God. But thanks to the Spirit's work through Martin Luther, these false teachings of the church were addressed.

And so, what do we know about God? "But God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which he loved us, even when we were dead in our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ – by grace you have been saved." Ephesians 2:4-5
