

Relational Health in Christ

If then you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. ² Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth. ³ For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. ⁴ When Christ who is your life appears, then you also will appear with him in glory. ⁵ Put to death therefore what is earthly in you: sexual immorality, impurity, passion, evil desire, and covetousness, which is idolatry. ⁶ On account

of these the wrath of God is coming. ⁷ In these you too once walked, when you were living in them. ⁸ But now you must put them all away: anger, wrath, malice, slander, and obscene talk from your mouth. ⁹ Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have put off the old self with its practices ¹⁰ and have put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge after the image of its creator. ¹¹ Here there is not Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave, free; but Christ is all, and in all. ¹² Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, ¹³ bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. ¹⁴ And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. ¹⁵ And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body. And be thankful. ¹⁶ Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God. ¹⁷ And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him. (Col. 3:1-17 ESV)

It's November! We might wonder where has 2020 gone? Some of us might be asking when is 2020 going to be over? I for one have found myself asking, "what am I going to focus on in this November newsletter?" There certainly isn't a lack of topics. The election and our current political atmosphere, ongoing concerns related to COVID-19, Thanksgiving and the rest of the holiday season, these are just a few of the topics available. One might even argue that since it is close to Reformation Day, we could also talk about the subject of grace and conflict with the body of Christ. Yet as broad as all these topics are, one topic that I noticed weaves its way through all of them and that is the subject of social/relational health in Christ.

You may remember that Jesus sums up God's commandments entirely on the basis of relationship. Love God and Love neighbor. You may also have noticed, scripture doesn't stop there and leave us to try to define love for ourselves. Read 1 Corinthians 13. It talks about the subject of love and relationships in great detail. We often hear this text at weddings, but its words are meant for the entire body and bride of Christ, the church.

Similarly, Colossians 3, which is also sometimes used as a wedding text, defines our relationship to each other in terms of our relationship to Christ. Regardless of what characteristics God may have created us with, or what groups we may have chosen to identify ourselves with, Christ is the defining factor for believers and one who defines our relationships. As the drawing above seeks to illustrate, when Christ draws us closer to Him, He draws us closer to each other. Nothing allows two people to overcome the barriers between them, more than God's forgiveness and genuinely seeking the Lord. Moreover, as we grow closer to the heart of God, we will start to reflect His heart, including for those who may not yet have a heart for us. In contrast to all the behaviors that break down relationships listed in the text above, notice the relational behaviors that grow in us as those holy and beloved by God: honesty, compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, patience, bearing with one another, forgiveness, love, and thankfulness. Now, if we are only looking at others, we might still be tempted to only display these behaviors when there are shown to us. We might also be quick to play the blame game when our relationships with others are not going well. However, if we focus on Christ, and seek to display the behaviors He would have us display in our relationship with other people, regardless of their actions, this could go a long way toward our own relational health (a healthy attitude toward others and our interactions). Hopefully, this will also lead to healthier relationships. Still, it is also important to realize that we can only be responsible for our part. We can't control others, but that should not stop us from growing, praying, and reaching out in love to all.

So what does this have to do with the topics at the beginning of this article. Clearly things like COVID-19 and politics have put a strain on many relationships (This includes with people we may have never met, like some of those in Washington, and yes those too are relationships). Thanksgiving and the holiday season can also be both a blessing and a strenuous time for families and relationships. For some, loneliness and distance are a big part of these times. Throw in COVID-19 and politics amid our normal holiday routines and things can get even more messy. Therefore, my encouragement to you is to ponder the following questions: How do you set your heart on Christ during these times? How do you encourage others to do the same alongside you? How do you apply the behaviors and lessons of love found in 1 Cor. 13 and Col. 3 to this? (*Read them again several times*). Are there things you are going to have to take hold of or let go of as you grow in your trust in God and in regards to your own relational health in Christ? Yes, these are difficult questions, but if you begin by looking to the Lord for forgiveness and help you are already on the right track. After all, Christ is the one who draws us all together. Thanks be to God!

THOUGHTS FROM THE DEACONESS

"We are a Minister of Reconciliation." 2 Corinthians 5:18

I don't know about you, but of the seven roles of Christians from St. Paul in 2 Corinthians, this one leaves me the most unsettled. I'm not sure that I want this task.

In its broadest sense, reconciliation means 'coming together'. It has aspects of truth, justice, for-giveness, healing, and love. When we are working to reconcile, we are trying to overcome a division between two people or groups or nations. But before that can happen, apologies and forgiveness must take place. And that is where my unsettledness begins.

"How often should we forgive our brother?" Jesus' disciples ask. They are keeping fingers crossed that Jesus will respond with just once. Instead, seven times seven. In other words, don't stop – ever. When apologies and forgiveness are present, both parties have become open and vulnerable to each other. Then, reconciliation can take place. It is the last step of true forgiveness.

For us, as baptized children of God, we are called – expected – to reconcile with one another. When there is a rift between us and another, we work hard to heal the wound. It may even be necessary to bring in a third party – a fellow Christian – to aid in the healing. And that is the second duty for us as baptized children. Not only do we reconcile with someone else when there is a problem, we need to be available to be the third party if so asked.

Reconciliation is not easy. Nor is forgiveness. But my unsettledness, and I hope also yours, disappears in the model of God who gave his own son to be the third party in the reconciliation between God and us.

"All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation." 2 Corinthians 5:18
