ON THE WAY TO THE MANGER

Micah 5:2-5a But you, O Bethlehem Ephrathah, who are too little to be among the clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to be ruler in Israel, whose coming forth is from of old, from ancient days. Therefore he shall give them up until the time when she who is in labor has given birth; then the rest of his brothers shall return to the people of Israel. And he shall stand and shepherd his flock in the strength of the LORD, in the majesty of the name of the LORD his God. And they shall dwell secure, for now he shall be great to the ends of the earth. ⁵ And he shall be their peace.

Time. A lot of time passed from the time when mankind's sin first brought about the need for a Savior, to when our Savior arrived in the flesh. So what was happening during that time? Was God sitting idly by watching the whole thing unfold? Certainly not. Our study of *The Story* so far this year has once again been showing us that God has been moving and active in the world from beginning to end. Starting with His promise to Adam and Eve and to other faithful believers as well, step by step the "one who is to be ruler in Israel, whose coming forth is from of old, from ancient days." has been at work and on his way to be our Savior. The time of waiting for this savior was not always easy. As we have learned in the first act of *The Story* and will learn further in act two, the nation of Israel and its people were often "given up" to feel some of the consequences of their sin. However, this did not mean that God had abandoned them. Instead He was pointing them to the need for the Savior who was to come.

Have you ever wondered what was it like for those who believed and tried to follow God during this time of waiting? What struggles, emotions, distractions, and spiritual mismessages swirled around them and in their own heads, as they waited for a Savior? What kept them on track or at least hoping in the Lord, as they lived their lives and looked to the future? Is what they experienced all that different from what we experience now, as we put our trust in the Lord in our daily lives and await His return?

During this Advent Season I hope you will take some time each week, as part of your devotional practice, to ponder what was it like for several of the people we often talk about this season. What was it like for Mary, Joseph, Elizabeth, John the Baptist, the shepherds, and others on the way to the manger and to the Christ Child? Contemplate your own path to the manger and the Lord, who was, and is, and is to come. What has that path looked like and where is going? Or more importantly to whom is it leading? Then join us Wednesdays and at other worship services throughout this Advent and Christmas season, as we meditate on some of those same questions, think about the individuals and what they mean for us as believers, walking together on the way to the manger and what comes next.

A Note of Thanks: Christmas and the season leading up to it is a time for remembering the importance of constantly counting our blessings and giving thanks. Normally in my November newsletter article, I offer a note of thanks to all of you who serve the Lord so faithfully in this congregation. Since I did not have the opportunity to do that last month, I want to do it here. Thank you for all of your efforts, your service, your financial support, and for all that you do to be the hands and feet of God here in this place, this community, and in the world. So much of God's work is done in and through His people, and I am grateful every day that we walk, work, and support each other together in this place.

On a related note, thank you to all of you who have sent cards, offered prayers, and have ministered to me during some health challenges. Your care, compassion, and encouragement to do what I need to do in order to be the best I can be in and for God's kingdom are a powerful blessing. Thank you for all your continued encouragement, support, and prayer for myself, our staff, our leadership, and our congregation, as we live together in mission. May the Lord be our strength and peace this holiday season and always. Amen.

If you are a Member who is 70 ½ or Older be aware:

Donors who are $70\ 1/2$ or older have a unique way to maximize some of your charitable giving. The IRS allows an otherwise taxable distribution from an IRA to be made directly to a qualifying charity like Faith Lutheran Church, with some benefit to the donor. The details:

- Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs) are Taxable income individuals must receive from an IRA once they reach the age of 70 $\frac{1}{2}$
- Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) are distributions made directly from the IRA to a Charity. Making a gift in this way lowers the donor's income from RMDs, thus reducing their federal tax liability even if the donor does not itemize deductions

The Indiana Department of Revenue and the Internal Revenue Service have determined that

- A QCD Does count toward a donors annual RMDs, and
- A gift made through a QCD is eligible for the 50% tax credit

"I Am the Bread of Life" John 6:35


