# Just Around the Bend

**Luke 3:4-6** <sup>4</sup> As it is written in the book of the words of Isaiah the prophet, "The voice of one crying in the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight. <sup>5</sup> Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be made low, and the crooked shall become straight, and the rough places shall become level ways, <sup>6</sup> and all flesh shall see the salvation of God."

When it comes to life, I find I am often surprised by what can be waiting just around the bend. Recently, I decided to take a hike in one of the places I have hiked several times before. However, no sooner did I come around one of the first bends in the trail, than I found myself face to face with something that strongly impacted the entire journey. Right there at the bend, its head facing toward me on the ground was a downed deer. I have to admit this sight was so unexpected that I jumped a little and an unsettled feeling immediately set in. What was it that had killed this animal? Was it still around? Might the killer or killers take an active interest in me?

What had started as a peaceful walk, in a place where before I had rarely perceived danger, suddenly took on a very different feeling. I seriously contemplated returning to the nearby trail and heading to the parking lot. Eventually, I did press on. Still, it was awhile before I no longer felt that different kind of alertness and I was able to stop clutching my hiking poles so tight.

Of course if this experience was a little unsettling, just imagine what the twists and turns of Holy Week must have been like for Jesus's disciples. As they traveled toward Jerusalem, I'd imagine some were a little nervous about the things they may have heard about certain religious leaders and what these leaders would like to do to Jesus and His followers. They knew Jesus was popular with some, but I wonder how many of his disciples expected Jesus to be greeted like royalty by so many, with palm branches and shouts of Hosanna. It was probably one of those rather unexpected high points for the disciples.

However, there were far more surprising and frightening things waiting for them just around the bend. The yearly tradition of a Passover meal and time spent together was suddenly interrupted with talk of betrayal and death. Jesus walked with the disciples to a solitary place to pray, only to have soldiers with torches come marching around the bend. Jesus, who in the past, had always somehow passed safely through the midst of those who meant to do Him harm, suddenly allowed Himself to be taken. All these twists in the road were just too much for them and so, at that time, the disciples chose to flee. Many of them hid, for fear that the killers might take an interest in them. Some ventured out to be confronted face to face with Jesus's death on the cross. Others may have experienced Jesus's death from a distance. Either way, despite Jesus's many warnings, this was one turn in the road none of them had really expected. Still, the greatest surprise was still just around the bend.

On Easter morning as the women turned the bend and saw the stone of the tomb rolled away, they really were not sure what to make of it. Frightened, sad, confused, they experienced all kinds of emotions at the strange twist in front of them. For many of Jesus's followers, it took the words of angels, the work of the Spirit, and the words of Jesus Himself to help what had happened truly sink in.

In the last place people had expected a victory, Jesus accomplished the ultimate victory on the cross. More than that, Jesus, the God and Lord of all, had now risen from the dead. Sin, death, and the devil had done their worst to throw every possible curve at Him, and Jesus had straightened them all out and come out on top. The twist, turns, and valleys — Jesus conquered them all, in order to make the path straight for His triumphant return, and open the way for us to enter into God's everlasting kingdom. Whatever twists and turns we face in this life, the day is just around the bend, when all flesh shall see once and for all the salvation of God. Part of the joy of Easter is knowing that we now share in the joy of that salvation. So whatever confronts us around the next bend, let us go forward with joy and confidence as we proclaim the one truth that is always before us, "Christ has died, Christ has risen, Christ will come again, and we will see His salvation for evermore! Alleluia! Alleluia!" Amen. In Christ,

"Greetings from Birmingham, Alabama!


Birmingham was one of the last places I thought I'd end up for vicarage, but in God's divine wisdom I now believe there was no better place he could have sent me. When I first received the news I was going to Alabama for my vicarage I didn't know what to think. I had never visited the state, I didn't know the first thing about the city of Vestavia Hills (a suburb of Birmingham), and I could really care less about college football (which is really a problem in Alabama). It was the only region of the United States that I had specifically said I did NOT want to go to. Needless to say, the seminary ignored that request because well, here I am and like I said I couldn't be happier! ....

On Sundays I do two things, teach and participate in the worship service. Teaching Sunday morning means, either I teach the 7th & 8th grade confirmation class or the adult bible study in the fellowship hall. Likewise, for Sunday worship I do one of two things. Most Sundays I simply lead the divine service as the liturgist, but about once a month I preach. When that happens, that is the extent of my responsibilities for that service, which I really appreciate since it allows me to focus completely on my preaching...

In contrast to the fellowship, one of the things that I have been working on — and I pray that I will continued to improve on — is my preaching. Everyone has been very gracious and supportive and I have received nothing but positive feedback from both my supervisor and the entire congregation, but regardless, I still feel like there is a lot of room for improvement. It would be great if this would just happen overnight, but God doesn't often work like that so I look forward to the next six months and further into the future as God makes these prayers into a reality...




