

ThanksLiving

1 Thess. 5:14-18. And we urge you, brothers, admonish the idle, encourage the fainthearted, help the weak, be patient with them all. ¹⁵ See that no one repays anyone evil for evil, but always seek to do good to one another and to everyone. ¹⁶ Rejoice always, ¹⁷ pray without ceasing, ¹⁸ give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.

Many of you have probably heard on the news and elsewhere about a number of concerns revolving around Facebook. Part of these concerns involve just how toxic the things that people write, are directed toward, and seem to seek out are. However, regardless of what Facebook may or may not be doing to perpetuate this, this is nothing new. Most forms of media, political individuals, and yes, even churches, have figured out that anger, pessimism, and a host of other negative emotions tend to sell and spread faster than anything else. We constantly hear more negative about people and events than anything else.

Now, we don't want to ignore the problems of the world or walk around with rose colored glasses. However, God does also want us to be thankful. As one who has been known to go beyond just a realistic view of the world and fall into the pit of negativity, thanksgiving does not always come easy. I may be thankful for those around me, but not always remember to say it out loud. (If that ever happens with you, know that you are still valued and appreciated and feel free to call me on it). Just in case, let me say thank you to all of you who richly bless me, our congregation, and our community on a regular basis!

Of course, gratitude does not end at Thanks-**Giving** to those who have blessed, in including God. What God truly desires from us is Thanks-**Living**. This kind of life shows our gratefulness to God in all circumstances, including the rough ones. This kind of life serves before people ask, without asking anything in return. This kind of life encourages those around us, and openly commends good wherever we find it. Thanks-living really is all those fruits of the Spirit and positive attitudes and behaviors you see throughout scripture, including passages like 1 Thessalonians 5:4-18.

This also ties into all we have been talking about throughout the last couple of months, involving Acts, the church's mission, and our role in it. Thanks-living motivates us to carry on the kind of self-sacrificial mission Christ began in our lives with life, death, and resurrection among us. Yes as a church we are called to call out sin, yet even more than that we are called to live lives that point people to Christ. As with other areas of life, thanks-living may involve stepping outside one's comfort zone. Praying at a meal in public, asking someone if you could pray for them not just in a difficult moment but in a joyous one, taking time to say thank you in a situation where you might normally have left it unsaid or said it without ever looking the person in the eye while you walked away...These are just the start of the kind of thanks-living that can build relationships and point people back to Christ.

Imagine what Facebook and other aspects of our lives would be like, if rather than constantly feeding ourself and others with anger at the touch of a button, we would set aside a month or more to get in the habit of limiting ourselves to posts that state important belief/positions in the positive and that encourage those places people are saying and doing good and positive things. In fact, this November, I want to encourage you to do 2 things:

Try to stick to sharing things on social media and elsewhere that are positive and encouraging. I will write a note on our church Facebook about this that you could include in places, which encourages others to join you in this during the month of November and which states the ultimate reason we are all thankful

THOUGHTS FROM THE DEACONESS

"Advent"

Advent (the start of the new Church Year) begins on Sunday, November 28. What with Halloween, Thanksgiving, and Christmas, those few weeks of Advent are often overlooked. If we do not have those weeks, do we lose anything? Is there any meaning in a baby without Advent?

Advent and Christmas go together, in the way that Lent and Easter do. Without Lent, Easter has no meaning. A man on a cross and an empty tomb make no sense without a time to reflect on what brought that man to the cross and tomb. With no knowledge and realization of our broken relationship with God, the cross and tomb mean nothing. It is the same with Advent and Christmas. A baby in a manger makes no sense without time to realize why that baby had to be born.

We may not know it or feel it, but we are in desperate need of Advent. Advent forces us to slow down and contemplate the meaning of the coming Messiah. Advent asks us to look again at our priorities in life and see if they will be in sync with the priorities of the coming Messiah. Do we want to run with the shepherds to the manger? Are we ready to tell what we have seen? Are we willing to know what that baby will expect of us?

Because of the coming of this baby, the prophet Isaiah foretold strange happenings in the world: nation will not lift up sword against nation people who walked in darkness will see a great light comfort will come to the people the blind will see sorrow and sighing will leave

These are only a few of the things that will happen because of the arrival of that baby. But these will not be realities unless we are involved. Nation will continue to lift up sword against nation unless we put down the sword of anger with our co-worker. People will not be comforted in their grief unless we enclose them in arms of love. There will only be light if we bring it.

We will finally be able to gather for worship in the sanctuary for the three Advent Evening Services—December 1, 8 and 15, 7:00pm. The liturgy will be one of our favorites, **Holden Evening Prayer**.
