# Something's New...It's You!



**2 Corinthians 5:17-21** <sup>17</sup> Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new cration. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come. <sup>18</sup> All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation; <sup>19</sup> that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation. <sup>20</sup> Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us. We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. <sup>21</sup> For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God

Have you noticed there is something new about you? I'm not talking about a new haircut, a new gift you got over the holidays, or some new pounds you may have gotten from going back for one more portion of your favorite Christmas food or desert. No the something new is you! Now, you may be thinking I don't feel that new. In fact, even in the last year, you may be finding any number of things in your life seem to be getting quite old. Joints may not be working the way they used to. Your memory may be having some storage and recall issues that make you wish you could get some new hardware. You may be finding that your patience and interactions with some people are threadbare to the point that they could probably use some work on the stitching that holds them together. Not exactly how most people picture new, right?

However, as Christians what makes us new goes beyond our parts and personalities. Our bodies may groan in one way or another until the day we die. Our behavior and relationships require constant work. Yet 2 Corinthians reminds us that, "if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come." In Christ, we have been given new life and new purpose. This involves both a "new now" and a "process of newness" as we await the things that are to come.

The "new now" is that in Christ, we have been reconciled to God. We are His children. Right now, this very moment, we already live in the promise of what will be. We will live eternally restored and reconciled in mind, body, and Spirit to God. Sin, death, and the power of the devil have had their eternal hold on us ripped away from them. We are the child who will live in relationship with God forever in paradise. In this way, the old, truly has passed away, the new has come.

At the same time, we also see a "process of newness" taking place. We all have those sinful habits that cling to us, much like the stiff knee that requires constant rehab clings to us or those couple of pounds we can never seem to drop cling to us as well. Yet, as we look forward to the day when God will remove all of our sinful habits and suffering and make us new once and for all, God calls us to begin the process of striving toward a taste of that newness right now. Making healthy choices, addressing behavioral issues, and reconciling ourselves to our neighbors; Renewing our minds, reminding ourselves of God's promises, and reorienting our lives through the power of God's Word and time spent in relationship with God; Serving as "ambassadors for Christ," growing in grace, and putting our trust in the one who "For our sake made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God." All these things are part of embracing the process through which we begin to more fully experience the new now that is already here. True there are some things that won't change until Christ comes back, but we are can turn those things over to Christ and call on Him for strength and comfort, and ask God to help us discern those areas where he is indeed calling us to reach toward something new. This is all a part of the new you.

So Happy New Year, brothers and sisters, and may God help each of us to embrace the new you.

### THOUGHTS FROM THE DEACONESS

"Another Way"

Herod the Great was his title. His reign over Palestine began in 47 B.C.; he was given the title King in 40 B.C.; he died in 4 B.C. In many ways, especially the early years of his rule, he was a decent king. He kept the peace, brought order to a disorderly country, built many fine buildings, cut taxes during natural disasters, and was trusted by the Romans. But even the best of rulers often has at least one character flaw. Herod was insanely suspicious and that paranoia increased as he aged. Five family members were killed at his order. Herod feared for his life and his crown.

As Herod neared the end of his life, magi came from the East. Scholars surmise that they came from the area of Persia and were wise men or philosophers or astrologers or soothsayers. Their role in society is not known and scripture isn't clear as to how many came. But they came because they had seen something different, unusual, unexpected in the heavens. It may seem extraordinary that men should travel a long journey to find a king, but the strange thing is that, just about the time Jesus was born, there was in the known world a strange feeling of expectation of the coming of a king. Even Roman historians at the time knew this. Tacitus tells of the belief that "there was a firm persuasion . . . that at the very time the East was to grow powerful, and rulers coming from Judea (Palestine) were to acquire universal empire." Herod was afraid, and even more so when the magi sought to find the child born "the King of the Jews". That was Herod's title.

The rest of the story is well known. Jesus is found with his parents. Gifts are given. As the magi prepare to return to their own country, they are warned in a dream not to return to Herod with the location of Jesus. They listen to the voice in their dream and follow the instructions. They do not go back to Herod and they don't travel the same road home. The magi go home "another way". We can surmise that their life's journey after seeing the King of the Jews was never the same again.

And what about the journey of our lives after seeing the baby? Do we stay on the same road in our life's journey or do we go "another way"?


