Valuing Marriage to Death: The Story of St. Valentine

Ephesians 5:1-2 Therefore be imitators of God, as beloved children. ² And walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God

Heart shaped cards, candy, and loving gestures, these are the things most of us think of when we think of Valentine's Day. Even in a world that now often defines love very differently and does not value marriage in the same way, few people probably think about stoning and decapitation being a part of what many consider the most romantic day of the year. This being the case, the story of the man might surprise you. In an interview with CBN, Father Frank O'Gara of Whitefriars Street Church

in Dublin, Ireland, tells the story of St. Valentine, this way...

He (St. Valentine) was a Roman Priest at a time when there was an emperor called Claudias who persecuted the church at that particular time. He also had an edict that prohibited the marriage of young people. This was based on the hypothesis that unmarried soldiers fought better than married soldiers because married soldiers might be afraid of what might happen to them or their wives or families if they died."

I think we must bear in mind that it was a very permissive society in which Valentine lived, 'says Father O'Gara. Polygamy would have been much more popular than just one woman and one man living together. And yet some of them seemed to be attracted to Christian faith. But obviously the church thought that marriage was very sacred between one man and one woman for their life and that it was to be encouraged. And so it immediately presented the problem to the Christian church of what to do about this."

The idea of encouraging them to marry within the Christian church was what Valentine was about. And he secretly married them because of the edict. (1)

Valentine was latter caught, imprisoned, and tortured for acting against the Emperor's edict. While in jail there are several stories about Valentines actions. These stories include a healing of the daughter of one of the men who was supposed to judge Valentine. This resulted in the man's conversion, and supposedly one of the last messages Valentine wrote was to this man's daughter, signing it, "from your Valentine." While we may not know for certain the accuracy of all the details of this part of the story, it does appear that for his defiant stand for marriage Valentine was ultimately sentenced to a three-part execution including beating, stoning, and ending with his being beheaded. In the same interview mentioned above, Father O'Gara had this to say about Valentines grisly death.

What Valentine means to me as a priest, Is that there comes a time where you have to lay your life upon the line for what you believe. And with the power of the Holy Spirit we can do that —even to the point of death."..

If Valentine were here today, he would say to married couples that there comes a time where you're going to have to suffer. It's not going to be easy to maintain your commitment and your vows in marriage. Don't be surprised if the 'gushing' love that you have for someone changes to something less gushing but maybe much more mature. And the question is, is that young person ready for that?"

So on the day of the marriage they have to take that into context, Love—human love and sexuality is wonderful, and blessed by God—but also the shadow of the cross. That's what Valentine means to me."

I think Father O'Gara's words are well said, not just for married couples, but for all of us. When it comes to love, we all live in the shadow of the cross. Our love is meant to go deeper than the superficial and self-centered love we see so often. Godly, love and service can be bloody difficult. St. Valentine reminds us of that.

Moreover, Valentine's sacrifice in the name of Christian marriage points us to the greatest sacrifice and marriage of all. When Christ died on the cross and rose again, He sacrificed himself so that we, the people of God might be His bride. Christ, our bridegroom, shed His blood so that we, His bride, could be covered in the brilliant garment of His righteousness, and remain with Him forever. Talk about a Valentines day gift or a wedding present! That sure beats chocolate!

Hopefully, knowing the story of St. Valentine's sacrifice and more importantly that of Christ, will make us all think a little differently about relationships, marriage, and sacrifice this year as we celebrate the love we have in Christ Jesus. May our love always flow from and resemble His.
