## **Re-Evaluating**

**Luke 14:27-33** <sup>27</sup> Whoever does not bear his own cross and comes after me cannot be my disciple. <sup>28</sup> For which of you, desiring to build a tower, does not first sit down and count the cost, whether he has enough to complete it? <sup>29</sup> Otherwise, when he has laid a foundation and is not able to finish, all who see it begin to mock him, <sup>30</sup> saying, 'This man began to build and was not able to finish.' ... Or what king, going out to encounter another king in war, will not sit down first and deliberate whether he is able with ten thousand to meet him who comes against him with twenty thousand? <sup>32</sup> And if not, while the

other is yet a great way off, he sends a delegation and asks for terms of peace. <sup>33</sup> So therefore, any one of you who does not renounce all that he has cannot be my disciple.

As we wrap up another school year, many students and teachers are taking a deep breath after completing yet another round of evaluations. While it is easy to be critical of how certain evaluations are done, this does not change the fact that, when done well, evaluation is important in many areas. Whether it is in schools, the work place, our personal lives, or in other places including our churches and communities, evaluation can be a great help, particularly in terms of our health and growth.

Those who get the most out of evaluation are those who approach it with honesty, a positive attitude, and a willingness to take the results to look toward the future. It is not hard for most of us to accept an evaluation on which we believe we will get an A+. However, what about those evaluations on which we know we will not do so well, or what if the evaluation reveals something we may not like? I think this is why many of us hesitate to do serious self-evaluation and why people often get fearful or defensive before many evaluation processes begin. What if I am not doing as well as I thought? What if the evaluation suggests I need to give up, change, or reconsider something I don't want to do? What if the evaluation shows the need for more work? When I am unwilling to accept the possible answers to these questions, I often find myself becoming avoidant, looking for flaws in the evaluation, or trying to find ways to write off the evaluation as a waste of time. Yet, ask parents of children who had to work through test anxiety, who needed to repeat a grade, who had different learning styles that needed to be identified, who worked through the unique challenges that come with being gifted, or who simply went through the process of regular exams, and they will tell you that when they worked through the evaluation processes and the corresponding follow-ups, the greatest growth occurred.

Rather than seeing evaluations in terms of the "good" results which will make us look good, and the "bad" results to hide from and avoid, when we are willing to take an honest look at ourselves, it is amazing how any results can become a powerful tool which God uses to help us move forward and to bring blessing. This is just as true in the Christian life. Part of the Christian life, Jesus says, includes evaluating what it means to bear our own cross and follow Jesus. Renouncing everything for Jesus includes being willing to take an honest look at ourselves, our home, and our churches and acknowledge those places where we are putting ourselves ahead of God. Even seemingly "neutral" areas may need to be looked at to make sure that we are not so determined to justify or do things our way that we have created our own "sacred cows." By refusing to evaluate such scared cows they will only continue to become that much more entrenched and unhealthy. However, by evaluating these and other areas we open new opportunities for the Holy Spirit to reclaim or change these things, so that the family of believers, and its interactions with those who do not yet believe, can be at their best.

Finally, it is important to recognize two more things. First, self-evaluation in particular is an ongoing process. A first grade teacher can help prepare for the future, but many more course corrections will be needed along the way. Our lives and churches are no different. Second, not all evaluation will require change. In fact, one of the ways God uses evaluation to help us grow, is by helping to point out the many areas in which we are doing well. Evaluation helps us to see how God produces blessings in our lives in areas of natural skill as well as challenge. So while some evaluation may lead to repentance and correction, all evaluation, when its results are turned over to God, can give cause for celebration. I look forward to celebrating with you as we continue to evaluate ourselves and our ministry here at Faith, especially in the months ahead. I also look forward to the future that the Holy Spirit, working through such ongoing evaluation, can bring, both in the church and in our individual lives. *In Christ.*.

#### FROM THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS


As summer arrives and warm weather (hopefully) returns, we continue to work on various projects at FMLC.



## THOUGHTS FROM THE DEACONESS

"Built on the Right Foundation" Sermon on the Mount, Matthew 7:24-2

The battle lines have been drawn. The king had chosen one road and Elijah another. Who will the people follow?

King Ahab and Queen Jezebel have been worshipping false gods and persecuting the prophets of the one true God. Elijah has repeatedly spoken against these two rulers. Who will the people follow?

Famine and drought have spread throughout the land. This is the punishment for not worshipping the one true God. But Ahab blames Elijah and refuses to change. Who will the people follow?

And now the confrontation on Mount Carmel. Elijah turns to the people, "How long will you go limping with two different opinions? If the Lord is God, follow him; but if Baal, then follow him." And the people did not answer him a word.

If we are going to get anywhere in God's kingdom, we cannot limp with two different opinions. We must lay a firm foundation with God as the head of our life. Standing on God's foundation may mean that other people will ignore us and laugh at us. Having God as the only ruler and guide in our lives may cause us to feel as outcasts in our own community or family or job. As a congregation, our only calling, no matter how difficult, is to point to God as the only salvation for this sinful world.

"The restoration of the church will surely come from a life of uncompromising adherence to the Sermon on the Mount in imitation of Christ". Dietrich Bonhoeffer

*P.S.* This article is the first in a series of six based on teachings from Christ's Sermon on the Mount. Dietrich Bonhoeffer, German theologian and martyr for the faith, strongly felt that these teachings could be a guide for the growth of the church and the spread of the Gospel. 
