

2020 Hindsight

Psalm 77: 1-20 I cry aloud to God, aloud to God, and he will hear me. ² In the day of my trouble I seek the Lord; in the night my hand is stretched out without wearying; my soul refuses to be comforted. ³ When I remember God, I moan; when I meditate, my spirit faints. Selah ⁴ You hold my eyelids open; I am so troubled that I cannot speak. ⁵ I consider the days of old,

the years long ago. ⁶ I said, "Let me remember my song in the night; let me meditate in my heart." Then my spirit made a diligent search: ⁷ "Will the Lord spurn forever, and never again be favorable? ⁸ Has his steadfast love forever ceased? Are his promises at an end for all time? ⁹ Has God forgotten to be gracious? Has he in anger shut up his compassion?" Selah ¹⁰ Then I said, "I will appeal to this, to the years of the right hand of the Most High." ¹¹ I will remember the deeds of the LORD; yes, I will remember your wonders of old. ¹² I will ponder all your work, and meditate on your mighty deeds. ¹³ Your way, O God, is holy. What god is great like our God? ¹⁴ You are the God who works wonders; you have made known your might among the peoples. ¹⁵ You with your arm redeemed your people, the children of Jacob and Joseph. Selah ¹⁶ When the waters saw you, O God, when the waters saw you, they were afraid; indeed, the deep trembled. ¹⁷ The clouds poured out water; the skies gave forth thunder; your arrows flashed on every side. ¹⁸ The crash of your thunder was in the whirlwind; your lightnings lighted up the world; the earth trembled and shook. ¹⁹ Your way was through the sea, your path through the great waters; yet your footprints were unseen. ²⁰ You led your people like a flock by the hand of Moses and Aaron.

Scripture spends a lot of time encouraging us by looking ahead to the hope that is to come and focusing on Jesus. At the same time, God also encourages us to live and serve Him in the moment. While the troubles of today and tomorrow may sometimes be a source of worry, God promises us that full restoration is indeed coming and that God truly is at work among us today in wonderful ways. So then where does the past fit in in relation to our present and future?

You have probably heard it said that hindsight is twenty-twenty. Given how this year has gone, I know plenty of people who say they would prefer to leave 2020 in the review mirror and never look back. This does not mean however, that many of us won't be tempted to fixate on all the struggles, sins, failures, missed opportunities, and other negatives of the past. At the same time, some may also look back on certain time periods as golden eras (probably not 2020) and spend a great deal of time wishing things could return to that remembered "normal." Unfortunately, both of these approaches tend to leave us stuck. We can't change the past and we can't bring it forward into the present either. Today will always be different from yesterday. However, God still has a use for the past in our lives.

Notice in Psalm 77 that in the midst of his present troubles, the Psalm's writer is able to look back and be reminded of all the ways God has been faithful. Even though in some ways God's "footprints were unseen," there was still no question that the forces of nature were at his command. There was also no question that He lead and cared for his children. He did this either directly or through the hands of some of those same children. These events of the past now shape and inform the present. Through the lens of faith, the past becomes something that each of us is able to meditate on, learn from, and give thanks for. In those time when our spirit faints and we are most filled with questions, God is able to use the past to point us, not to try to relive the past, but to God. Hopefully, this Psalm and things like studying *The* Story this past year, have reminded us of this. God will continue to be present and work among His children, and God's love will remain, no matter how much the passage of time may bring about new joys, normals,

Speaking of questions, you may remember when we were still right in the middle of 2020, I gave you several questions to ponder. As we look back on this strange season, that in many ways we are still in, I encourage you to take time to ponder and to discern some of the lessons and blessings God has offered to us this past year. So again I ask you:

How are you doing?

Where have you seen God this last year?

What has God been teaching you this last year?

How has this time affected your relationships and the way you approach them?

What about your routine or change in routine has pointed out a need for change in the long run?

Are there areas you have started to see the need for growth or perhaps have begun working on them?

Are there things that were helpful to you during this time or things that were not?

Are there other questions that you have learned you need to be asking?

How do questions like these help you to look to God?

How do questions like these help you live and serve God in the present, and look with hope toward the future?

How can we go about supporting each other in leaning into questions like these?

As we enter 2021, I would love for you to share with me your responses to some of these questions (I encourage you to do so either by phone, letter, or by email). Even if we have not arrived at answers yet, or are struggling with the questions, I think we could gain a great deal from having conversations around these questions and each other's experiences. Growth and life together is after all an ongoing process. Finally, I once again encourage you to share how I, our prayer team, or others in the church could pray for and support you, as redeemed in Christ and growing in grace we continue to care for one another. May God continue to bless and make His presence known to you.



"We are the Temple of God." 2 Corinthians 6:16

What do you think of when you read the word 'temple'? Temple Mount in Jerusalem; Solomon's temple; Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom; Temple University; Hindu Temple. Most of us probably think of a place of worship. We may even envision one of the large cathedrals in Europe. But I doubt that we think of ourselves as a temple, and even more than that, a temple of God. Hard to imagine that God would dwell within us.
